

The Origin of Screamo

Screamo (Or Skramz when referring to the new wave of Screamo) is a term used to describe a genre of music deriving from hardcore punk which began in the late nineties. To understand the origins of this sub-sub-genre we must look at its name through an etymological lens. Screamo, an amalgamation of "scream" and "Emo" helps trace its origin to the Emo sub-genre of hardcore. Emo, is of course, also an abbreviation originally standing for Emotional Hardcore, then abbreviated to Emocore, then simply Emo. Emotional Hardcore, or first-wave Emo originated in the eighties DC hardcore scene with bands like Rites of Spring, Moss Icon, Embrace, and Dag Nasty who felt that hardcore was too angry and wanted instead to express their sadness. This was done through slowing down songs, making them more melodic, and having lyrics focusing more on

This was done through slowing down songs, making them more melodic, and having lyrics focusing more on interpersonal struggles and self-reflection; and with this Emowas born.

Later, in the early 90s, this formula was done again, bands like Sunny Day Real Estate, Texas Is The Reason, and Cap 'N' Jazz took emotional hardcore, and made it slower, more melodic and more whiny, creating second-wave Emo. Once again, people felt like this didn't fully connect with them. This was too slow, too whiny, and arguably couldn't even be considered hardcore anymore. So bands, like Antioch Arrow, and Heroin blended the idea of interpersonal lyricism from Emo and blended it with the explosiveness of Power Violence, a genre known for extremely fast tempos, short songs, and yelled vocals; Gaining the name Emo Violence. As these bands grew in popularity, so did the amount of bands emulating and developing their sound. By the late

nineties bands like Orchid, Saetia, and Pageninetynine had established themselves and developed the genre's now characteristic screeching lyrical styling.

By the mid 2000s this genre had all but died out, but its name remained. Bands with no connection to this scene began to be labeled as screamo, for having similar, yet distinctly different vocal styles. This coupled with most of the original bands breaking up, worsened the problem of misuse of this term. Pop bands like Panic! At The Disco, and Fallout Boy began to be labeled to be labeled at Screamo and Emo whilst being made fun of by both the mainstream, and the underground. This quickly resulted in what was left of the original Emo scene dying out.

Following the COVID-19, this genre was miraculously revived through bands like Vs Self, Catalyst, and Knumears gaining large underground followings through TikTok. This inspired a whole new generation of people to listen to and make screamo music creating an explosion of new screamo bands. This new wave was dubbed Skramz to separate themselves from the often misused term Screamo, though both terms are still used. The last four years have seen this scene flourish and expand all across the world.

Today, Skramz is hard to characterize, its most fast and, it's mostly loud, but many bands have pushed against this and expanded what Skramz could be by blending the sound with other genres. Being an active member in the New York City scene I would describe the scene as extremely caring, often doing charity events and releases, and extremely unserious as the irony of beating eachother up in the moshpits to song about introspection seems to be intertwined into everything from the merch, to song titles.

Releases of The Year (In my opinon)

From the explosive to the somber, 2024 saw many incredible releases. Connecticut-based mathcore inspired band xclocktowerx's incendiary 3 song debut release Greatest Hits: Vol 2 is frantic for its entire 4 minute (including a 40 second sample from the movie Casino) runtime. Artificial Bouquet is a dissident post-rock masterpiece from the Illinois-based Frail Body. Demo from New York favorites Ted Williams is the group's debut project, Demo is a hyper-ironic eruption of heavy instrumentals and screeching vocals. Fear of The Fall, the newest release from Texasbased Sinema, is an ode to early 2000s posthardcore blended with Skramz creating a sound of their own. California-based Febuary's debut EP February is an instant classic beautifully blending seemingly contradictory guitar styles, and inconsistent tempos topped with gut-wrenching vocals. Sub-Sub-Genres

Obviously, screamo, like any other sub-genre of hardcore has its own sub-sub-genres under the screamo umbrella. These sub-sub-genres have their own distinct musical styles, and often clothing styles.

Post-Screamo

Post-screamo is a style of Screamo heavily inspired by the Post-Rock bands like Slint, or Godspeed You! Black Emperor. Post-Rock is characterized by heavily layered, noisy droning guitars layered with a minimalist lyrical style. Post-Screamo takes the psychedelically dissident instruments and layers in screaming vocals. Examples of this style would be envy, Infant Island, Frail Body, and Othiel.

Kittencore

Kittencore is a style of Screamo characterized by its higher-pitched, softer vocals. Some earlier examples of this would be Portraits of Past, In Loving Memory, and ...of Death, and a contemporary example of this style would be the New York band silk.

Bedroom Skramz

Bedroom Skramz is a combination of the lo fi indie pop genre Bedroom Pop and Screamo. Bedroom Pop is characterized by lo fi, often self produced beats, and soft vocals. Bedroom Skramz takes the instrumental styles of Bedroom Pop, and swaps the soft vocals for Screamo Vocals. Some examples of Bedroom Skramz would be Your Arms Are My Cocoon, Flowers Taped to Pens, and departmefrombearisland.

Emogrind

Emogrind is the combination of Screamo, and Grindcore. Grindcore is a genre originating in the 1980s which combines Crust Punk, Thrash Metal, and Extreme Metal. Grindcore is characterized by growled vocals, overdriven bass, down-tuned guitars, and blast beats. Emogrind takes the Grindcore formula and blends it with Screamo characteristics to make an extremely heavy and extremely fast style of Screamo. Examples of this style would be Tears of Avarel, daughters of eve..., and Coquette.

Blackened Screamo

Blackened Screamo, like Post-Screamo, is a blend of two genres, Screamo and Black Metal. Black Metal is a genre of metal known for its loud, fast-tempo guitars, dark themes and shrieking vocal styles. Blackened Screamo finds an unhappy medium between traditional Screamo vocals and Black Metal shrieks, and takes influence from the tremolo guitar-picking style and double-bass drumming style. Some examples of this would be Zmar, Slowly Building Weapons, and Zorn.


What is the screamo look?

Screamo, like any other punk derivative, has deep anti-capitalist and anti-consumerist ethics. This manifests in anti-fashion attitudes, seeing the industry as frivolous and consumer behavior, instead focusing on more DIY approaches to fashion; because of this many people say there is no "look" or "uniform" for the modern scene.

During its first wave in the late 90s to the early 2000s, the scene had a much more distinctive look. Skinny black jeans, tight t-shirts, chokers, and Converse Chuck Taylors, but almost thirty years since the conception of the genre, this is no longer necessarily the case.

So, in an effort to figure out what the elements of Screamo fashion are, I asked fans and musicians what they thought the look is, and they is what they had to say...
